Mehmed II was born on 30 March 1432, in Edirne, then the capital city of the Ottoman state. His father was Sultan Murad II (1404–1451) and his mother Hürma Hatun, a slave of uncertain origin. Augustus (also known as Octavian) was the first emperor of ancient Rome. Augustus came to power after the assassination of Julius Caesar in 44 BCE. In 27 BCE Augustus "restored" the republic of Rome, though he himself retained all real power as the *princeps*, or "first citizen," of Rome. Augustus held that title until his death in 14 CE.
